Agility with Whippets

I think the most fun you can do with your Whippet, or any dog, is agility, and agility is the most popular dog sport. I asked Jean Maclean, the owner of "the library dog" in the previous newsletter, to tell us about her experience:

"I have raised five Whippets from puppies and the first three were obedience dogs. I

was not aware of agility in the 80's and early 90's.

The two Whippets I have now did obedience and Rally. Both Taddie and Donny have several titles. I started hearing more about agility, as I was working with Donny. I didn't know if I would be able to do agility, as I have asthma and it is often hard to run. I had some friends who were taking lessons in Santa Ynez, and I got the information about the classes and signed up. My intention was to see if I could do it, and if both I and Donny could learn the courses and obstacles. We started training and managed to conquer the jumps without any trouble at all. Donny learned the dog walk and A-frame but was a little unsure of the teeter. We had a little more trouble with the weave poles but he finally got them down. We are not super fast like the Border Collies, but Donny does a decent job. We were having fun, and I was amazed at how much more bonded we got to each other. I had no intentions of showing in agility when I started but we were doing so well I thought why not.

We entered our first show, but Donny was not as secure at the agility show sites. We continued to practice and go to trials, and I remember how happy I was when we got our first agility novice leg. Now Donny has both his Novice agility and Jumper preferred titles and his Open agility and jumper preferred titles. It has been a fun experience and I have learned so much in the meantime.



There are quite a few Whippets doing agility. Some are very good, and there is one out there somewhere that is a MACH 8, which means he has achieved Master Agility Champion 8 times. It is not easy to get these titles as it takes 20 double Q,s, which means you have to qualify in Master jumper and Master agility at the same show plus 750 points. He did it 8 times! I saw a Whippet was invited to the Eukanuba agility trial in Florida in December and had nice clean runs.

If you would like to do something with your Whippet pal that is fun and rewarding for both you and your dog you could find a class in your area and try it. Basic obedience is a plus to pursue this. You do not need Obedience or Rally titles to compete in the agility sport, but your dog should be able to do sit, down, stay and come. Have fun if you decide to play agility."
